

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science students' factory visit

This month the science students of grade 11 and 12 had the incredible opportunity to visit a chemical manufacturing plant and learn about its inner workings. We visited Neochem to learn about what happens behind the scenes in a chemical industry.

Neochem is a chemical company that boasts over 200 products. We were treated to a tour of the facilities at their factory with Arvind Sir, the plant's manager as our guide. He gave us a thorough tour of everything from the raw material storage to the manufacturing plant to the R&D lab. All of these spaces were huge and it was truly a treat to get to see them.

One of the core tenants at Neochem is sustainability. The plastic storage containers in which bulk chemicals are housed are sent back to manufacturers to be reused once they are empty. Every waste product released during manufacturing down to the steam that is evolved is captured and recycled back into the system and reused in future processes. The only waste they release into the atmosphere is formaldehyde but only in small amounts. They are currently working to streamline their process so that even that miniscule amount of toxic waste doesn't enter the environment. Seeing this glimpse into the possibility of sustainability particularly in the chemical and textile industries, both of which are notorious for their rampant water use and chemical waste, was truly inspiring.

Overall, it was a very informative and enjoyable trip. Getting a peek into the behind the scenes working of everything from how the colors in our clothes are made to the paint on our walls was fascinating and I'm really glad we had the opportunity to visit.

We in grade 8 recently had our warmth experience. We reached school at 6am where we walked around in the cold morning air without our jackets, shoes and socks to keep us warm. During the experience our feet were numb, faces were cold and a few of us even quit midway. This was a mere glimpse of the harsh reality millions of people face across the globe, except they don't have the choice to quit.

Once the experience concluded we were shown some alarming data that shook us to our core. In India alone, 800 people die annually during the winter. However the cold isn't the problem, lack of clothing is. If each and every individual had access to warm clothing today, cold wouldn't be a kill tomorrow.

So we decided to make a change by initiating a warm clothing collection drive. We partnered with 10 different NGOs, donating clothes, blankets, gloves and so on. Now we have collected over 1000 pieces of warm clothing that will help protect the people of Ahmedabad from the cold this year and save lives.

This experience has helped us improve our persuasive skills, organization, time management and ability to work as a team. Most importantly, it has made us realize the value of the clothing we possess and the privileges we are lucky to have. Because a jacket to us may be a mere piece of clothing, but it could mean the difference between life and death for someone else.

STUDENT CORNER. grade 09 mastery: a process

Robert Greene once said, "Mastery is not a function of genius or talent. It is a function of time and intense focus applied to a particular field of knowledge." This quote encapsulates the essence of Mastery at Riverside. Mastery is a process where students explore a question they are intrigued by, conduct in-depth research, and present their findings to a jury. Recently, we in grade 9, were given the chance to experience this one-of-a-kind process. We dedicated ourselves to researching, interviewing experts, and presenting our findings. Along the way, we honed a variety of skills, including research, critical thinking, effective communication and presentation in front of a jury.

How does an athlete's upbringing influence their success on the field? Is globalization exploiting developing nations or boosting their growth? Questions like these are present in the mind of every highschooler but between juggling academics, sports, extracurriculars and healthy social lives, most of us never find the time to dive deep into any of these intriguing topics. Yet they are ever present at the back of our minds, tickling our curiosity and waiting to be answered. The Mastery process was our chance to answer some of these lingering questions, to dive deep into a new topic and uncover fascinating information through masterclasses, interviews and research.

We started our journey by picking a question and had the liberty to select a question from any domain, ranging from an individual's belief system to socio-economic topics. We came up with questions that took more than a single google search to answer.

"My topic primarily revolved around the metaphysical debate surrounding the existence of God — a vast and complex subject. To explore this deeply, I consulted numerous websites, read extensively, and designed questionnaires for experts in the field. The process demanded intense focus and taught me invaluable lessons in time management. Balancing this research alongside extracurricular activities and academics was challenging but rewarding all the same. As someone who often struggles with organization, this journey helped me cultivate structure and efficiency in managing my commitments."

After some preliminary research on our question, we had to create a mind map with the key details pertaining to our question. From there, the real journey began. We began contacting experts, looking through research papers and spent hours scouring the internet for pertinent information. Finally, after two weeks of wading through the endless sea of knowledge, we developed a fairly deeper understanding of our topic. But that wasn't the end. Before our jury presentation, we wrote a report of our findings of our research question, citing multiple research papers and evidence collected from domain experts.

The final step was presenting our research and findings to a jury. Our heartfelt gratitude to Fozia Ma'am, Joshua Sir, Kumar Sir, Simran Ma'am, Aarti Ma'am, and Andrew Sir, who not only gave us invaluable feedback, but pushed us to delve deeper into our respective questions. Mastery not only deepened our understanding of our topics, but also equipped us with essential life skills, making it a truly metamorphic experience. All in all, Mastery pushed us to traverse through the ocean of our thoughts in order to identify our passions.

STUDENT CORNER. grade 09 mastery: excerpt



Cognitive biases are a person's tendency to perceive and interpret information based on preconceived notions, ideas and beliefs that the person inherently believes. Cognitive biases evolved as mental shortcuts to help us process information quickly in order to differentiate between danger and opportunities for better survival. For example, confirmation bias—the tendency to seek information that confirms pre-existing beliefs—helped early humans focus on

familiar patterns, such as avoiding dangerous places. However, now that survival is not the ultimate goal of life, cognitive biases also minimize judgment and critical thinking, leading to biased decision-making and information processing. Confirmation bias could be weaponized to make people develop a one-sided view about the world as any contradictory information or alternate perspectives would be unconsciously discarded.

Perhaps the most horrific example of this taking place historically is during the era of Nazi Germany. While considered a dictatorship, historical evidence suggests Nazi actions were supported by the German people. This raises the question of how the German population could endorse the removal of their civil liberties, the initiation of a devastating World War, and the orchestration of an inhumane genocide. Calculated propaganda, through mediums like posters, films, and speeches, exploited cognitive biases to brainwash the German populace into hating Jews (and other undesirables) and revering Hitler. It portrayed Jews as the root of Germany's post-World War I struggles and Hitler as Germany's savior, despite the absence of any real evidence for either. In doing so, the Nazis were able to corrode the moral principles of an entire nation, manipulating the public into becoming partners in the mindless Nazi war machine and the atrocities of the Holocaust.

While the Holocaust should remain a closed chapter in human history, the mechanisms used to enable it certainly have not stayed artifacts of their time. Cognitive biases continue to shape our perceptions through targeted social media, echo chambers, and political messaging. Recognition of this fact brings a responsibility to remain unbiased. As history has shown us, unchecked biases can have devastating consequences, but awareness and education can help shape a generation that values truth and open mindsets, a generation that will not repeat the mistakes of the past.

A masterpiece made, at the end of a lifetime, With many strokes, both beautiful and fine.


One life saved, one unfairly taken,

actually a story with a deep take on the most important things in life.



The Diary of a Young Girl by Anne Frank

Nazis and sent to die in a concentration camp, this book is a reflection on what living in the midst of a greed-driven world-crushing war for power is really like.



And this book, this dark yet truthful diary, this memoir of a girl not much older than me right now, instils the values of kindness, of courage, and of love, not hatred into readers and helps them become the change the world needs. A must read for anyone and everyone.


