ACTIVE LEARNING

Students of Keystage 2 engaged in active learning methods, such as making sense of the skeletal system through an actual skeleton in order to be able to visualize process that they would normally only read about. Additionally, the use of hands-on activities as a Riverside 'Language of Learning' lets the students learn experimentally and with more

autonomy.

COFFEE AT RIVERSIDE

Grade 7 had a discussion with Mr Ashwin Trivedi - leader of the Signal School program in Gujarat, in order to get to know the processes the initiative follows better. This allowed them to split into groups according to their strengths and interview a leader to get to know him better. They plan on partnering with Signal Schools for Citizenship in the near future.







THE IMPACT CHALLENGE

Grades 11 and 12 analysed data from a survey done by Harvard on Riverside and UWC schools in order to understand the purpose behind and impact of the processes they undergo on a daily basis. The grades were divided into groups and made presentations to display their findings through the course of the last week. In order to gain greater insight they met alumni, the founding teachers as well as a UWC school alumni.

THE IMPACT OF LANGUAGE

Grade 12 has been learning language through processes such as rotating chair and fishbowl discussions on topics such as education and sexism.





CHALLENGES!

Grade 10 kicked off July with the Business challenge from Mitti Cafe and Compass Box Studios to help them with online marketing. The projects are based on selling the story and purpose of the firm, not just the product.
